

Art Scholars





2022-23 was the second year of the Art Scholars program at Davis Elementary School in College Place. Students participating in this program were identified as needing additional support due to behavioral, social, academic, and/or trauma challenges. We provided three 7-week sessions, reaching 156 2nd-5th grade students and 199 K-1 students. The lessons provided a space for these students to create art while growing their social emotional learning competencies. Their art making empowered their personal expression, built confidence, and provided an opportunity to try new things in a safe and encouraging environment.

ECEAP Program

CPL partnered with Educational Services District-123 (ESD 123) for a second year to provide expressive art programming for preschoolers in the Early Childhood Education Assistance Program (ECEAP). Whole class art activities were offered in Walla Walla, Prescott, and Touchet classrooms. Students were introduced to the Mood Meter, a component of the RULER system developed by the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence to track their emotions at the beginning and end of their art sessions. During these sessions, students participated in Artful Thinking exercises and SEL-centered art making, creating Calming Boxes, Nature Safe Spaces, and a variety of other projects. We hosted several family nights with ESD 123, including a special Art Chopped event at the Walla Walla Center for Children and Families.

Rural Art Initiative

Art Chopped Family Nights

We started the Rural Art Initiative in 2020 as a partnership with Prescott School District (PSD), a preK-12 public school of 280 students, about 80% of whom live in farmworker housing for Latinx families. Working closely with the school, we identify potential areas of collaboration between artists, educators, teachers and students. Our curriculum responds to the PSD community's diverse interests, lived experiences, and geographical contexts.

This year, our two artists-in-residence, Tia Kramer and Amanda Leigh Evans, collaborated with students and teachers at PSD on several public artworks that envision the Touchet river watershed as a device for social-emotional learning and as a metaphor for migration and belonging. In addition to developing public artworks, the artists organized classes, movement activities, field trips, guest lectures with local artists, and a visit from Fanny Garcia, an oral historian from Columbia University. With a weekly presence at PSD, our artist-led programs and classes served over 400 PreK-12th grade rural students, teachers, and families.









The 2022-23 school year brought another round of Art Chopped Family Nights. Due to popularity and demand, we expanded our program, hosting 13 Art Chopped Family Nights in Walla Walla elementary and middle schools, serving 137 families for a total of 492 people! Family teams participated in two rounds, receiving mystery boxes of items to integrate into a collaborative artwork of their design. Supported with items like scissors and glue, families could also choose items from the Art Pantry; tables filled with myriad supplies to create their masterpieces. Our Art Chopped events feature an art gallery, art walk, and photo booth with props.

Creativity Curated


As part of our strategic planning process during the COVID-19 pandemic, we expanded our vision and mission to increase our impact for young people in our region. Consequently, we shifted our programming model to be more targeted and responsive to the needs of the students we serve. We focused on delivering high quality content that includes national standards.

In 2022-23, we redesigned our flagship classroom program, Creativity Curated. In the past we provided only three lessons a year. Now, we deliver weekly art lessons to all students in the five public elementary schools in Walla Walla (about 2,200 students). The Creativity Curated program included classiscal and contemporary, diverse artists while emphasizing social-emotional learning components and creative/personal artistic expression. We introduced art concepts through artists and their work and encouraged artmaking, sharing, and reflection.

To deliver this program, we invested for the first time in trained professional staff. The impact of this investment has been huge. We more than doubled the amount of classroom time students received, from 300 to nearly 800 classes during the school year! The frequent presence of CPL staff and volunteers in the schools created additional benefits—increased engagement between teachers and students around art, additional artmaking opportunities during lunch and recess, greater exposure to art/artists/art materials, and enhanced impact on students of all backgrounds.
